### Antique Buttons and Tools

*Our own Anita Gaudreau*

...in her own words:

I have been in Greenville for almost 40 years and raised my three daughters here. Over the years I have owned four businesses in the downtown area, including a restaurant, a vintage children's book shop, a needlework shop and an antique shop housing twelve other dealers.

Throughout that time I have bought and sold antiques, doing shows in Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma. My focus in the antique business was handmade items from Victorian women including the tools they used to make them. Early on I found myself keeping some of the better pieces I found and my collection grew over the years. I retired from the business in 2003 when I married but still collect and try to keep up with the market.

I have been a needleworker all my life, having learned embroidery from my Grandmother at the age of five. In 1999 and again 2000 I had the opportunity to study in England at the Royal School of Needlework. Classes were held in Hampton Court, King Henry the 8<sup>th</sup>'s castle, and we stitched in the sun room of Ann Boleyn.

I always admired the beautiful quilts my sister made but the process seemed too difficult for me. I attended the last quilt show the Guild held and from that decided to try to learn to quilt and you know the rest of the story!
